

Course Description

W University of Connecticut

Welcome to the University of Connecticut and UNIV 1810! This is a first of two one-credit courses designed to provide you with the opportunity to explore issues relevant to new students at the University of Connecticut (you are expected to take the continuation of UNIV 1810 in the spring). Our goal for this semester is to provide an open forum for discussion about college transition issues and concerns, to promote greater self-awareness, growth, and understanding of you as a scholar, individual and global citizen, to build a community among new Global House residents and finally to connect you all to the resources and opportunities offered at UConn.

This course is designed to be fun, supportive, practical, and intellectually challenging. Most of our work in this class will be cooperative. Therefore, our success will largely rely on active, earnest participation from you. Students who successfully complete the course will leave with critical thinking skills, increased cultural competency, an ability to think globally while living locally, knowledge of UConn resources, time management and study skills, and the responsibility of living in a residential community. In addition, we hope that you will have some fun memories, confidence, and meaningful connections with faculty/staff and your fellow students.

Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of the semester you will be able to:

- Recognize the principles of critical and creative thinking, and apply them to all three realms of your first year experience: academic, personal, and global.
- Recognize your strengths and weaknesses and reflect on your personal growth as UConn students
- Build relationships with other Global House residents.
- Explain the vision and goals of Global House.
- Describe your own background and understand your relationship to the rest of the world.
- Recognize the diversity of our worlds and practice basic skills needed to actively and ethically contribute to a globalized society
- Recognize and engage with social and academic support services and enrichment opportunities offered at UConn.
- Successfully transition to the university environment.

Course Format

The Introduction to Global House course meets weekly for the fall semester. Class meetings are for fifty minutes and take place in the Learning Community Lounge, unless otherwise specified. On occasion, there may be required outings and/or events that occur outside the regularly scheduled meeting times. These will be announced by the instructor ahead of time.

This is a discussion-based class designed to develop global awareness, analytical thinking and communication skills. Topics discussed will include the college transition, the culture and politics of countries across the world and significant and current local and global issues. Students will be expected to be active participants in class discussions. To participate fully, students should complete assigned tasks prior to class, and read designated materials. There will be several journal assignments that require students to reflect on their activities and transition to UConn.

Requirements

<u>Class participation (10%):</u> Attendance and participation are crucial to your success in this course. Absences will hurt your final grade by reducing the points you receive for the participation and in-class work. If there are special circumstances causing absences, please contact your instructor by email. Excessive and chronic tardiness to class will also affect your participation grade.

<u>Journal Assignments (30%):</u> All 3 journals should be 2 pages, double-spaced, Times New Roman with 1" margins. Papers will be graded based on depth of thought and relevance but grammar and spelling will be taken into account as well.

1) Involvement Fair Journal:

Attend the Involvement Fair on *Wednesday, September 9, 2015 between 2 and 7 pm on Fairfield Way.* Write a reflection on your experience, what you gained from attending and what you learned about UConn student organizations. In addition, interview a representative from one organization of your choice and get answers to the following questions:

- What is the name of the group/organization?
- What is the group's purpose/goal? What makes this organization unique?
- o How long has this organization been on campus?
- What is a significant annual event/activity of the group? What is the significance of this event?
- o What particular skills have they developed as a member of the organization?
- Are you interested in joining this organization? Why or why not?
- o How could participating in this organization challenge and strengthen your college resume?

This journal is due on **Sept 17th.**

2) Education Abroad Fair Journal:

Attend the Education Abroad Fair on *Thursday, September 10, 2015 between 4-7 at the Rome Ballroom.* Write a reflection on your experience, what you gained from attending and what you learned about UConn education abroad programs. In addition, interview a representative from one program of your choice and get answers to the following questions:

- What is the name of the program, its location and purpose?
- o For how long has this program been in place?

- What are some of the activities that are covered in this program?
- Would you be interested in joining this program? Why or why not?
- O How could participating in this program challenge and strengthen your college resume?

This journal is due on **Sept 17th.**

3) Interview Journal:

Choose one of your current professors (not graduate assistants or teaching assistants) to interview. Schedule a one-on-one meeting for an approximately 15-minute interview. The purpose of this interview is to learn more about a faculty member as well as gather strategies/approaches for handling certain areas of concern. After the interview, be sure to follow up with a thank you email.

After the interview, you will be responsible for typing a summary and offering any insight you gained through the interview by addressing the following:

- * Who did you interview and why? (please include the faculty member's name and department)
- * What was the focus of your interview or what were you hoping to gain from the experience?
- * What did you learn from the professor (in regard to your interview's focus)?

Sample Questions: (Ask a minimum of 10 questions)

- 1. Where did you receive your undergraduate/master/PhD degree? What was your major?
- 2. What is your favorite thing about being a professor?
- 3. What is your least favorite thing about being a professor?
- 4. If you had to offer one piece of advice to first-year students, what would that be? What would be your prescription for thriving at college?
- 5. What was your first year of college experience like?
- 6. When you were little, what did you want to be when you grew up?
- 7. How did you end up at UConn?
- 8. What does the term "Global Citizen" mean to you?

This journal is due on Nov 12th.

Critical Reflection Essay (20%): Global House will be organizing two Global Forums this semester. You are required to attend both of them but you will be asked to select one forum as the basis for a critical reflection paper. You will then engage in the academic conversation by writing and revising a brief essay summarizing as well as critically reflecting on the event. The focus of this reflection should be on your analysis and interpretation that answers the question, "so what?" Because revision and review are vital elements to this process, you will visit the University Writing Center (http://www.writingcenter.uconn.edu/ and https://uconn.mywconline.com/) with a group before revising and submitting your final draft. Due date for the first draft is **Oct 15th** and due date for the final draft is **Dec 17th**.

Resume Assignment (20%): This assignment has five easy steps: 1) drafting the resume using the template provided by the Center Career Development (CCD), 2) attending an in-class presentation by CCD, 3) researching and reflecting on a professional working in a field you are interested in pursuing, 4) attending a resume critique and 5) submitting your final package consisting of the original draft, critique notes, and final version. The final document is due on **Nov 5th.**

Country Project (20%): You will be asked to select a country (other than your own) to report on in class.

- Prior to the second class, email your top 3 choices of countries to your instructor (your choices need to cover at least 2 different continents and should not include your own country). For your #1 choice, explain in two sentences why you have chosen this country. Countries will be assigned during the third class.
- News Info (10%)- Every week, read news articles related to your country (ideally a newspaper from that country if you can find one in a language you can understand; if not try different news sources from other countries each week). Be prepared during each class to share what's going on in your country. Each student will be asked to share news about their country at least twice during the semester.
- *Country Presentation* (10%) Give a 5-minute Powerpoint presentation about your country. Introduce your classmates to the country, its culture and any current issues or hot-topics. Presentations will be scheduled in the second half of the semester.

<u>Final</u>: This class does not have a final exam but you have to turn in the final draft of your critical reflection essay by **Dec 17th.**
